

Nestled in a quiet and quaint small town, just down a dusty gravel road, lived a family plagued with a mystery they can't solve. Diana, born in March of 1978, the youngest of four children all born within six years, is caught in the crossfires of distress, battling her own illness and the ones haunting the family. Diana and her siblings must make their way in this world as their mother's health fails and their father's alcoholism strangles the family system. Roles shift, no longer dependant on age or ability, but who can do the job. They say lightning doesn't strike twice in the same spot, but as luck would have it for the Kirk family, it does. Tony's experience and background is extensive as he has worked in many different areas of the human relations field. Tony's most notable creation was the QIRS.com website in 2006, it was meant to assist/aid the former students of the residential schools to help them navigate the complicated IAP compensation process while working with 2 different law firms. Taking pride in working with his peers and Elders from all over Canada in this process has given Tony the ability to advocate for the residential school survivors.

Application for the above dual Credits for Saskatchewan high school students is found under programs. When students submit the application form to the early learning email – this indicates the fee is waived. The staff manning the email will work with the registration staff to register them in the courses. The registration staff may follow up with the school to ensure the applicant is a student. <u>https://saskpolytech.ca/programs-and-courses/part-time-studies/building-the-future.aspx?utm_source=short-url</u>

The students should work with their guidance counselor or Principal to ensure they register these classes with the Ministry of Ed for dual credit for their high school transcripts. Registration Deadline: Fall – September 10, 2022, Winter - January 15, 2023. After students apply, they will be sent their textbooks and registered in the Winter classes. There is room for 90 students in each course.

*Successful completion of all three ECE 106, ECE 142 and HUMD 183 will provide eligibility to apply for the Ministry of Education's Early Childhood Education 1 certification which is the entry level for working full-time at licensed childcare centers more than 65 hours a month. Great after school or summer employment opportunity.

If a student chooses to take one or two of the courses the Ministry of Education Early Years would recognize that they have started their Level I. Students can work in a licensed childcare center and would have the possibility of being put on an education plan. With that plan the Ministry of Education Early Years would reimburse the student \$500 a semester for a course they take towards their ECE certification.
