JANUARY HAPPENINGS

Prior to the meeting with the Minister of Education (see above), the Board held its regular Committee of the Whole meeting, where they worked on the Board Policy Review.

The following were topics at the regular Board meeting on January 23:

- The Board approved a Student Support Services Report that included potential initiatives to address increased classroom complexity. The report covered the activities of Educational Assistants, Child and Youth Counsellors, Pyschologists, Speech and Language Pathologists, Occupational Therapists, Student Support Consultants and Teachers as well as the Addictions Educator.
- Reports were also received on Early Years Education and the Independent Education Program (IndEP).
- Following the meeting, Trustees participated in the annual School Community Council (SCC) Chairs Meeting, where Structured Literacy, Parent Engagement and SCC supports were discussed.
